Costs to Stop RICL

The financial burden: Since the formation of The Alliance the volunteer board of directors has planned for the financial burden of stopping RICL. Costs are directly related to the length of the fight and the need for legal consultation and expert witnesses at a public hearing. Rock Island Clean Line filed their petition for franchise on November 6, 2014 which begins the IUB process. The financial burden falls squarely on the shoulders of landowners, businesses and other concerned citizens across the state.

With an estimated 1540 parcels of land impacted, the average cost per landowner to fight RICL is \$300. To date Alliance members have given that amount and in some cases much more. The Alliance advocates on behalf of landowners, families, businesses and community members and is committed to providing individuals and communities across the state with resources necessary to protect private property rights of land owners.

Eminent Domain

Landowners, tenants, families, businesses and community members are opposed to the use of eminent domain to take private property, including prime agricultural land for economic gain. Ongoing publicity related to this important issue is necessary to assist all lowans in understanding how this can impact them in the future.

Easements

Low numbers of signed voluntary easements sends a strong message to the lowa Utilities Board. The Preservation of Rural lowa Alliance strongly encourages landowners to fully understand easement agreements and to contact their attorney to review the agreement. Several red flags have been identified in the easement agreements including the damage clause, negligence clause, actual easement area, abandonment clause and ability to access other areas of property during construction or maintenance.

Evidence suggests that landowners will receive more compensation if they wait for condemnation and landowners have greater protection under lowa's eminent domain stature.



Property Value

Ongoing research indicates there is a measurable effect on land values with high voltage transmission lines. That effect ranges from a loss of 10% to 30% of the overall property value which significantly impacts the long term value of all types of property and businesses.

The Electrical Transmission Line Franchise Process includes the use of eminent domain to take private property. RICL intents to use this process for their project.

Objections

Anyone can file a formal objection with the lowa Utilities Board. The lowa Utilities Board and RICL closely monitor not only the number of objections but also how many landowners have filed objections. If you are opposed to RICL, consider filing your personal objection. The Alliance can assist with obtaining the needed information.

Why The Preservation of Rural Iowa Alliance Work is Important

The Alliance strategy includes representation of all landowners at the lowa Utilities Board Public Hearing. Ongoing work in several key areas includes but is not limited to:

FERC: Research of the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission rulings and their impact on this project.

Leaislation: Understanding existing eminent domain laws and working with legislators to advocate for needed change.

Misconceptions: Constant review and response to news media to address misconceptions and inaccuracies.

<u>Cost Allocation:</u> Understanding aspects of cost allocation and how it may become a reality if this project is approved.

Illinois: Communication with Illinois leaders and monitoring the Illinois portion of the RICL project.

State Agricultural Organizations: Ongoing work with various organizations including commodity groups and Farm Bureau.
